Passagassawakeag Greenway CITY OF BELFAST TRAIL SECTION



Trail Information

The Passy Greenway City of Belfast trail section is a 1-mile loop trail that begins at the parking lot off City Point Road.

Difficulty: Moderate, with a steep incline and some uneven ground.

The Trail

Belfast's 'City of Belfast Section' of the Passagassawakeag Greenway is a 1-mile loop nature trail located on property owned by the City of Belfast that offers visitors an enjoyable walk in close proximity to downtown Belfast.

Situated along City Point Road, just beyond the Knowlton-Swanson-Stephenson Preserve as you leave town, this trail explores a beautiful mixed hardwood-conifer forest and crosses several small streams before climbing to a highpoint on the bluff that looks down across much of this parcel.



This section of the Passy Greenway trail system was made possible by an agreement between Coastal Mountains Land Trust and the City of Belfast to allow a year-round nature trail to explore this city-owned parcel.

During your visit, look for...

Northern white-cedar, *Thuja occidentalis*, also called arborvitae or "tree of life" which dates from the 16th century when the French explorer Cartier learned from the Indians how to use the tree's foliage to treat scurvy. **Japanese knotweed**, *Fallopia japonica*, a widespread invasive exotic plant that is a pest and threat to native habitats throughout midcoast Maine.

Hints of the property's land use history as Belfast's former ski slope. As you walk the property you might notice forest patterns that show where ski runs once existed or you might find the machinery from the old rope tow.

Passy Greenway City of Belfast Trail Section Guidelines

Please help us keep this trail a pleasure for all who visit this natural area.

- This trail is open to the public for lowimpact recreation during daylight hours.
- Removal of native vegetation is strictly prohibited.
- Fires and camping are not allowed.

- Vehicles, motorized or non-motorized including bicycles and horses, are not allowed on the trail. Bikes are to remain in parking areas only.
- Bicycles are not permitted on the trail except in parking areas.

From Route 1...

Heading South into Belfast, take first exit after the bridge towards Route 7/137. Turn left onto High Street. Follow straight past convenience store, road becomes City Point Road. Follow approx. 1 mile. Entrance to parking lot is first left around curve after you pass the Knowlton-Swanson-Stephenson Preserve.

Heading North, Take Route 7/137 Exit (first exit after Reny's Plaza). At stop sign, go straight for one block. Turn left onto High Street and straight across Route 1. Follow straight past convenience store, road becomes City Point Road. Follow appx. 1 mile. Entrance to parking lot is first left around curve after you pass the Knowlton-Swanson-Stephenson Preserve.
